THE SOBRATO FAMILY

Builds Buildings Futures

he Sobratos struck it rich.
So now the family, whose real estate development business has flourished in Santa Clara Valley for 45 years, pours its money into local organizations that help those who are less fortunate achieve their economic and educational goals.

Community involvement spans generations in this family — the late Ann Sobrato, who first entered the family into the real estate business in the 1940s, volunteered as a pink lady at a hospital in the 1950s. Since then, she, her son, John A., his wife, Sue, and their three children, John Michael Sobrato, Lisa Sobrato Sonsini and Sheri Sobrato — who now have families of their own — have given money to and participat-

munity involvement even

further with the formation of the Sobrato Family Foundation, which awarded more than 500 grants and invested more than \$10 million in nonprofits before 2002.

John A. Sobrato says that he and his mother started the foundation because they felt it was "incumbent" upon them to give back to the community.

know about hard work. During World War II, the family had difficulty obtaingrow its own produce. After Ann's husband passed away in 1952 and she sold the restaurant and proper-

ty, John A. saw how profitable selling the land was and founded Midtown Realty in Palo Alto at age 21. Ann, who had developed the first "tilt-up"-style building in Redwood City in

1955, joined him in the venture.

John A. ran Midtown Realty until the mid-1970s, when he sold it and created Sobrato Development Companies to concentrate on real estate development. The new company, which John Michael later joined, has developed and built facilities for high tech companies and owned thousands of apartment units.

However, community members are more likely to associate the Sobrato name with generosity. In 2000, the family donated 124 acres of land to the Morgan Hill Unified School District for its new high school, which is named in

The family also introduced a multimillion dollar revolving loan fund in 2001 to help local nonprofit housing developers create affordable and transitional housing. SIM Rebecca Ray

In 1996, the family extended its com-

ing produce, which was rationed, for Ann's husband's restaurant business in San Francisco. Ann invested in property in Atherton so that the family could
